Focus on Uganda

Supporting child-headed and vulnerable households

in Masese, Uganda

dvantage Africa has worked with vulnerable children, displaced by conflict and poverty in northern Uganda to the slums of Masese, since 2007. Most recently we've funded social workers from the Adolescent Development Support Network (ADSN) to support 56 vulnerable children and adults there. It's given them greater stability and purpose in their lives and helped the children make the most of their education. One of the young people involved even got a job with ADSN and is now 'giving back' to the project that gave him his big break in life.

The charity Street Child Africa is ensuring the continued success of this project and with the well-being of the beneficiaries in safe, committed hands, we're now concluding our involvement. Faith is one woman whose life has been transformed by the Masese project. She cares for seven orphans in the Masese slums and has a history of fragile health, so Advantage Africa supported her and her family with healthcare, nutrition and training in tailoring. With her new-found skills, Faith is now an accomplished seamstress and earns a regular income making

uniforms for the local primary school. She was overjoyed to see Advantage Africa's Uganda Programme Manager Jane Betts during her recent visit to Masese and recounted the many improvements in her life. She told Jane: 'I have a business now and a bank account! We might have died without your help, but we can buy food and we are healthy. We are so, so happy!'

Single parent families in Uganda

There are millions of single parent families in Uganda, many of them headed by widowed mothers or grandmothers. Advantage Africa's long-standing partnership with the Single Parents' Association of Uganda (SPAU) helps vulnerable families to access education, healthcare and improved nutrition as well as find ways to generate income for their basic needs. As these single parents come together to learn new skills in livestock-rearing, candle, craft or shoe making, they also forge friendships, grow in confidence and become more resilient to life's challenges.

The Bulange Single Parents' Group has 50 members, mostly widows, who live with their children in cramped slum housing in Kampala. Advantage Africa has helped them to earn an income by making candles and to protect their families from malaria with insecticide-treated mosquito nets. We've also supported them to overcome

the anxieties of living with HIV, write wills and prepare for the future through 'memory work' training.

Alice is a single parent of five young children who is living with HIV. SPAU found her close to death from multiple infections caused by her low immunity. They helped her to receive counselling, treatment and a nutritious diet. Alice now counsels other people with HIV on how to 'live positively'. She enjoys making candles with the other women and talks enthusiastically about how she no longer feels alone, but

has found happiness and hope. Alice led all the women in a spontaneous, rousing rendition of 'Amazing Grace' on learning that

Advantage Africa is based in Olney where John Newton composed the famous hymn. She loves leading the Bulange group in joyful songs and dances and says: 'I don't want to see any sad faces!'



The 60 members of the Gobero Single Parents' **Group** have learned skills in rearing poultry and are now benefiting from good yields of nutritious eggs. Advantage Africa also helped them to access HIV medicines and protect their families from malaria. Kate was widowed in 2010 and cares for seven children. She says:

'Things are much better than before. Since the nets there is no longer any terrible fever in our house.'

Advantage Africa has helped the **Ggaba Single Parents' Group** of 40 families living in slums outside Kampala to meet together twice a week to make crafts such as shoes, jewellery, baskets and table mats. Group leader Mary says the shoes sell particularly well in the local markets. Most of the group is affected by HIV and Eva says: 'Life is still up and down, but it's not like it was

before. Now we can afford transport to get our medicine.'



Seven years later, the school has nearly 300 pupils and includes a thriving nursery section. The children, parents and teachers are so proud of their school. Despite ongoing challenges, the older pupils' academic achievements are in the top ten for the whole of Luwero District!





Advantage Africa's support to the Nsumbi Single Parents' Group's poultry-rearing enterprise helped another 30 vulnerable families to earn an income to meet their basic needs for food and medicine. We've also enabled them to establish a muchneeded nursery school for the orphaned and vulnerable children in their community. The nursery was opened, amidst much jubilation, by SPAU Director Paul Lwanga and our Programme Manager Jane Betts in February 2013. It now provides 45 youngsters with a foundation of basic learning and fun in their difficult lives, and releases their carers for a few hours each day to earn an income.

Funding news and needs in Uganda

Changing lives in Bowa Kibiira

A charitable trust and two of Advantage Africa's generous supporters recently donated over ten thousand pounds so that 60 single parent families in the village of Bowa Kibiira could realise their aspirations for a better life. The kind couple involved also attracted matched funding by first pledging their support through 'The Big Give'. If vou're able to donate £500 or more to a similar project, why not ask us how it could be multiplied in the same way?



Despair in Katente

In the remote rural village of Katente, Mukono District, we've identified 60 families living in extreme poverty and poor health without a source of safe water or the means to earn an income. Our partner SPAU has helped the families form a group and plan a project that will put an end to the deep despair in which they currently live. There will be mosquito nets to prevent malaria, a well to end the long treks over steep terrain to find water, training in livestockrearing for protein and

income, and memory work to help families respond to the immense challenges of HIV.

£18,000 is required over two years for the project, so we're breaking it up into chunks. £3,000 is needed for malaria prevention, £6,100 for the pig rearing, £5,000 for the water point ... It's going to be a big challenge but this is how many of our projects are funded! Do you think your family, work or church community could fundraise for part of this project?

Ggaba Partnership

Advantage Africa's new partnership with the Ggaba School for Special Needs Children on the outskirts of Kampala will help disabled boys and girls to learn, have fun with their friends and

to reach their potential. The project will also assist parents to support and encourage their children and raise awareness about inclusion and respect for disabled people in the wider community. Just £50 pays for a teacher's salary each month.



The Olney Lions Club recently gave £500 to equip the new nursery in Nsumbi and the funds were sent just days later. The Club said: 'Cash handed over on Monday and already making a difference in Uganda by the end of that week. Now that really is an efficient donation'.
